## Caring for Others

Bathampton Disability Day Report by Mrs Wood

On Friday 21<sup>st</sup> January we all took part in the schools Disability Day. The aim of the day was to raise awareness about disability and begin to have an inkling of what being disabled is like.



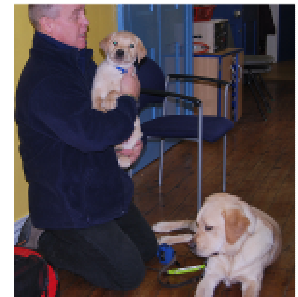
For some the day started with trying a variety of wheelchairs where they learnt how to steer them around corners, slow down, keep them in a straight line when going along a slope. They also discovered how difficult it is to open doors. Other Classes tried out guiding in pairs, where one child was blindfolded and given a guiding stick and helped on their way around the playground by their guide.



Some of the younger children were developing their bandaging skills, by bandaging their teddies and then fitting them with mini wheelchairs, while the older children tried out various gadgets and games used by blind and partially sighted people. These included colour sensors to check what colours you are wearing, water sensors to tell you when your cup is full and games adapted so that you had to feel what to do rather than rely on your sight.

Later on in the day classes tried out blind eating, where children discovered the

importance of remembering where you put things down and foot painting which turned out to be extremely difficult and demanding on their leg muscles.



The day was finished off by a visit from the Guide Dogs for the Blind. All in all it was a really surprising and fun packed day. We are grateful to Mrs Wood for planning the day, and to Petra for supplying an extraordinary range of items and organising an inspiring and unforgettable day.

### *Bird Watching Hit Bathampton*



On Tuesday 1<sup>st</sup> February we celebrated the official opening of the Bathampton Primary School Bird Hide. The ribbon was cut by ex-pupil Shane Bowditch, currently at King Edwards School. The Bird Hide was Shane's idea, and it has taken three years to arrive at the point of opening the hide. The opening also marked the official start of the school Bird Watching Club.

The bird hide is located at the bottom of the school field and is large enough to accommodate groups of six children. One member of each group will be a designated group leader. The senior members will be responsible for locking and unlocking the bird hide, checking equipment is safely stored and giving helpful guidance to other children in their group.

The Leaders have applied for the position in writing. One child noted in his application 'I cannot birdwatch at home as we have two cats and it is not fair to feed the birds in our garden. It will be fun to do it at school'.



As part of the bird-watching initiative Class Four have made six high quality bird boxes. The children worked in teams with Vic Ross, an experienced ornithologist and grandparent and also parent Tony Berry who is a carpenter.

The children really enjoyed the experience. Each bird box has an entrance designed to attract a particular bird. The bird boxes will be put up in the school woods. The class later forensically examined owl pellets to learn about the bird's eating habits.

The school already has a bird box with a camera in it that enables children to watch birds feeding their young during the spring on a dining hall TV screen.

### **Bird Watching Fortnight**

Ms. Johnson, a newly enthusiastic ornithologist, has been taking her class out into the woods during this fortnight. Trainee teacher Mr Veck also created an ingenious computer game which encourages children to identify bird song.

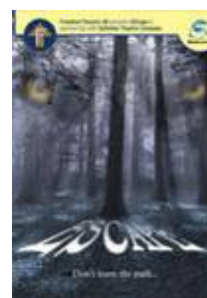
